At Montgomery, Ala., a stern judge who at one point threatened contempt action levied heavy fines against 13 white defendants and seven Negroes arrested while eating lunch to-

A white college professor, one white student, and five of the Negroes drew fines of \$100 and costs on their convictions of disorderly conduct.

The sociology professor's wife, 10 white students, and two other

Negroes, also college students, were fined \$50 and costs.

Defense attorneys immediately announced plans to appeal to higher court. Bonds were fixed at twice the amount of the fines.

Negro Cafe Raided

Prof. Richard D. Nesmith, his wife, and 10 of the white students are from MacMurray College in Jacksonville, Ill., and the other white student is from the other white student is Roston University. The Negroes are all from Alabama.
All 20 were charged with disorderly conduct when police

raided a Negro cafe where they were lunching together April 1.

Professor Nesmith, a native of Belleville, Kan., drew a \$100 fine along with two Negro ministers, the Rev. S. S. Seay, Sr., and the Rev. R. E. DuBose, Jr., the Bosion University student, R. Edwin King, a Negro student, James Richburg, and two former students who were recently expelled from Alabama State College for Negroes. All of the defendants made their appeal bonds and were released.

UDENT AND NEGI VAILED IN ALABAMA

MONTGOMERY, Ala. MONTGOMERY, Ala., July 12 (AP)—A visiting white the ology student and a Montgomery Negro were jailed again today after their second conviction for trying to dine to-

viction for trying to dine to-gether in a downtown hotel. Fined \$100 apiece and or-dered held pending further sen-tencing tomorrow were the Rev. R. Edwin King, 23-year-old part-time Methodist minis-ter and student at Boston Uniter and student at Boston Uni-

versity, and Elroy Embry, 33.

After hearing their appeal case without a jury, Circuit Judge Eugene Carter convicted them on a trespassing charge. He dropped charges of refusing

to obey an officer.

Judge Carter levied the fine immediately and ordered Mr. King and Mr. Embry jailed until he handed down a decision tomorrow on the length of sen-

tomorrow on the length of sentence. The maximum penalty for trespassing is \$100 fine and six months at hard labor.

In the City Court conviction they appealed, Mr. King and Mr. Embry were fined \$100 each and sentenced to ten days hard labor on the charges of trespassing and refusing to obey a policeman.
