

MONTGOMERY, Ala. (AP) -A white theology student and a Montgomery Negro yesterday were sentenced to three months in jail and fined \$100 each for trying to dine together in a white restaurant.

Circuit Judge Eugene Carter set the penalty after the second trial on the charge for Rev. R. Edwin King, 23-year-old student at Boston University, and Elroy Embry, 33.

Carter heard the case without a jury, just as he did July 12 in convicting them of the trespassing charge. The judge set the same penalty both times.

King and Embry were re-leased under \$1000 bond each, pending an appeal to higher court.

The two men, who were originally convicted in city court, were granted the second trial in state court on the ground that the city failed to introdace as evidence the trespassing ordinance they were accused of violating. The ordinance was submitted as evidence yester-day.

STUDENT AND NEGRO JAILED IN ALABAMA

MONTGOMERY, Ala., June 7 (AP)—A white theology student and a Negro companion, fined hours before for having eaten together, were jailed again today for seeking service at an all-white downtown hotel.

The Rev. R. Edwin King, a white ministerial student at Boston University, and Elroy Emoory of Montgomery, a Negro, were charged with tres-passing and refusing to obey a policeman.

Shortly before, Mr. King, Mr. Emory and six Negro compan-ions had been fined \$100 and \$43 costs each for eating lunch with twelve white visitors in a Negro cafe March 31.

Policeman J. F. Kennedy said Mr. King and Mr. Emory had walked into the Jefferson Davis Hotel coffee shop today and had asked to be served.

MONTGOMERY. (AP)-A white theology student from BOSTON and a Montgomery Negro were convicted a second time for trying to eat lunch together in a white downtown hotel.

The Rev. R. Edwin King, 23, part-time Methodist minister and student at Boston University, and Elroy Emery, 23, were fined \$00 each on a charge of trespassing.

Circuit Judge Eugene Carter, who heard the appeal case without a jury, ordered the two sent to jail pending a decision later on the amount of hard labor he will impose. The maxinjum sentense for the charge is \$100 fine and six months in ja I.

A new trial has been ordered for a white theology student and a Montgomery Negro sentenced to jail terms for trying to dine together in an all-white hotel coffee shop.

Circuit Judge Eugene Carter set the trial for next Wednesday for Rev. R. Edwin King, 23year-old part-time Methodist minister and student at Boston University, and Elroy Emery, 33.

King and Emery have been free under \$1000 appeal bonds since Carter convicted them July 12 on a trespassing charge. He fined them \$100 apiece and sentenced them to three-month
